Shinran Shonin was born on May 21, 1173 in Hino, an area southeast of Kyoto. His given name was Matsuwakamaru. His loss of both parents at an early age moved him to enter the Buddhist priesthood at age 9. He studied for 20 years on Mt. Hei, home of 3,000 monasteries, enduring the most difficult of meditations and practices. At age 29 he abandoned the method of finding enlightenment by self-power (jiriki) and placed his faith in Amida's power (tariki) to realize Buddhahood. Shinran coined the term "Jodo Shinshu" meaning "True Teachings of the Pure Land".

Why Choose Jodo Shinshu?

I read an article in the spring issue of “Buddhadharma” magazine that gave me more hope for the future of Jodo Shinshu in America. It was about the New York Buddhist Church and how it has become home to a racially and ethnically diverse cross-section of New Yorkers. The photo for the article reminded me of that day in Hilo when the Monshu visited and a lot of us went through lay confirmation. The faces of the majority of the members showed their Japanese ancestry, of course, but there were also a number of haoles, including a Jodo-Shinshu minister, and a couple of Afro-Americans.

The temple is a member of the Buddhist Churches of America, which, like the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii and the Jodo Shinshu Buddhist Temples of Canada, is affiliated with the Nishi Hongwanji temple in Kyoto. It was founded by Rev. Hozen Seki in the late 1930s. Seki grew up in Japan and had served at a temple in Los Angeles before founding another in Phoenix, Arizona. When he decided to found the New York temple, he flew cross-country in an open-cockpit plane with a Japanese pilot and navigator. Four years after holding the first services in New York, Seki was sent to an internment camp, but returned after the war to help the temple grow. In 1951, he founded the American Buddhist Academy. In 1955, the temple acquired a statue of Shinran Shonin that had stood in a park in Hiroshima only a mile from where the atomic bomb hit. Famous Zen priest D.T. Suzuki spoke at the statue’s dedication ceremony. In the 1970s, Seki ordained three Caucasian ministers, which did not please the Jodo Shinshu authorities in Japan. His daughter admitted Jodo Shinshu is kind of a hard sell in America because, “It doesn’t have that exotic Asian flair or mystery. As a Shin Buddhist, it’s simple. We rely on Amida Buddha and say the sacred name, and that’s it.”

The first thought that struck me when I saw the photo of the sangha was, “Why would any haole choose Jodo Shinshu,” which got me thinking, “For the same reasons as anyone else. Why would anyone choose Jodo Shinshu?” Now, you may be thinking, “You chose Jodo Shinshu, crazy haole man. We didn’t have to choose. Our parents, grandparents and all our ancestors were Jodo Shinshu.”

More than with most religions, however, we choose Jodo Shinshu every day. Every time we say the Nembutsu, we are saying, “I believe in the power of Amida Buddha to bring me to the Pure Land and give me enlightenment. I have faith that this ‘other’ power truly exists in me and everyone, without exception.” That’s an amazing thing to believe. In gratitude, I say “Namu Amida Butsu” a lot. If we ever stop choosing Jodo Shinshu, we will never say the Nembutsu again.

Personally, I’ve been unknowingly baptized a Catholic and knowingly baptized a Protestant Christian. I’ve studied and continue to study the religions of the world. I’ve gone through Soto Zen lay confirmation and received the Zen Buddhist name Chigen. The teachings of Shakyamuni Buddha and Dogen have had a profound affect on my life, for which I am eternally grateful. Zen practice has only deepened my faith in Amida Buddha. I still practice Zazen several times a week, but I know any small steps I take toward enlightenment are due solely to the power of Amida Buddha, not my own. If the other power of Amida Buddha was not within me, a million years of Zazen would not bring me enlightenment. Rev. Shoji used to say if he couldn’t rely on the power of Amida Buddha, he knew he could never reach enlightenment. Since his only hope was Amida, that’s where he placed his faith. I feel like that too, though in my case, Zen practice has only made Amida, and my faith, more real.

Most religions promise that those who believe in it will be saved, someday. Jodo Shinshu goes one better by saying Amida Buddha (or whatever you choose to call the other power that is in us and everyone) has already saved all of us, without exception, whether we believe it or not. How can we not just say, “Gee, thanks,” to an offer like that? So we say “Namu Amida Butsu” and as we do, we choose Jodo Shinshu yet again. Are we right to do so? Shakyamuni Buddha advised people to believe only what they had tried in their own lives and found to work. All I can say is that Jodo Shinshu works for me, so I advise other Americans to “Try it. You’ll like it.”

CUB SCOUTS PACK 12

Pohakuloa Training Area – Day Tour

Our day started by meeting at Kona Hongwanji at 06:45am and leaving for Saddle Road and (PTA) Pohakuloa Training Area. Thanks to Cub Master Glenn Hirowatari and U. S. Army Garrison PTA's Lieutenant Colonel Eric Shwedo, activities were arranged for our Pack and Parents too.

When we first arrived, we were directed to the base theater, which was housed in a Quonset hut. We were given a lecture and presentation by the "Environmental and Cultural Division" on what each division

does. PTA has 220 Civilian employees and cover over 156,000 acres. The Environmental division makes sure that the military does not destroy any endangered plants or animals. They are also in charge of weed control and over population of animals such as goats and sheep who sometimes destroy endangered plants and animals. The Cultural Division also protects areas within PTA. If an area is deemed a Cultural area, such as a trail, heiau or a cave that shows evidence of past living areas, they are placed on a list of protected areas that are off limits to the military. We all thought that PTA was all Military movements. It's nice to know that they are showing sensitivity to our Aina. After the lectures we were divided up in groups and taken outside to an area which had samples of endangered plants (which was fenced off). Then they led us to another area with samples of equipment used for weed and pest controls. Another area allowed our scouts to pretend and use equipment on how to detect cultural sensitive areas.

Next stop...PTA provided 2 white School buses to take us down to the Fire Department. The Federal fireman provided demonstrations and access to their ambulance, fire truck and huge water truck. They are on duty 24/7. Their area of responsibility runs from where they are to the two ends of Saddle road and to the tops of Mauna Kea and Mauna Loa.

PTA's Engineer Division had their "Earth Movers" close by to the fire department. Military soldiers in the Engineer divisions demonstrated what each machinery did. The engineer department is responsible for repairing all roadways damaged by weather and wear and tear from military movement.

A viewing tent was also set up with a few M-4 rifles with scopes and a big 50 caliber machine Gun on the ground for the scouts examine and take pictures with. Although this was the shortest stop for the scouts, this display had the most impact on the scouts and their dads.

Towards the end for the visit Cub Master Glenn was presented with the PTA COIN, it's an oval coin with a cutout of the Big Island, inscribed U.S. ARMY GARRISON POHAKULOA TRAINING AREA, ALWAYS BE READY, THE PACIFIC'S PREMIER JOINT TRAINING CENTER. On the back it states AWARDED FOR EXCELLENCE, presented By the Command Team.

Our final destination...we were bused back to the beginning, the theater. We gathered to take a group picture then had lunch at their outdoor gazebo. What a memorable day....
