MINISTER IN RESIDENCE AT KONA HONGWANJI **Reverend Bruce Nakamura** **Effective September 4, 2014**

At the Board of Directors meeting on June 11, 2014, President Norma Matsumoto received communication from Bishop Eric Matsumoto that Reverend Bruce Nakamura will be assigned to Kona Hongwanji as its next minister. Reverend Nakamura is currently assigned to Lihue and West Kauai Hongwanji Mission for over 2 years. Bishop Matsumoto approved his vacation from August 28 to September 3, 2014. He stated "Rev. Nakamura is a dedicated and committed veteran minister of Hawaii Kyodan and asks the help and support of temple members and its leaders to move Kona Hongwanji and the Hawaii Kyodan into a more secure and brighter future. We must return Hawaii Kyodan to a united Sangha". Kona Hongwanji looks forward to having a veteran and dedicated minister with Big Island roots to reach out to our members and increase attendance at church services and share the Dharma with the community at large.

His first service will be on Sunday, September 7, 2014 at 9:00 a.m. Please join us to welcome Reverend Bruce Nakamura to Kona Hongwanji. Refreshments and fellowship will follow in the social hall.

Pre-School iPad Fund: The iPad Fund raising has ended. Thank you very much for your support to the Pre-School. We have reached our goal of \$1,500. We have purchased 3 iPads with covers for 3 classrooms. It has arrived and distributed to teachers. Director Nancy Powers Grant is developing Guidelines for its use. You may visit the classrooms to see how it is being utilized by calling 323-3737.

Mr. Yasunori Deguchi: "Mr. D" (as we affectionately call him) was awarded the **Legion of Honor medal from the French Government** at an awards ceremony at Pearl Harbor on July 2, 2014. He was one of seven (7) Japanese-American members

of the famed 442nd Regimental Combat Team and the 100th Battalion who was honored. A member of the Canadian Army who is currently residing on Oahu was also honored. "Mr. D", age 89, veteran of World War II and member of the 442nd Regimental Combat Team received two Purple Hearts. As he stated, "veterans view the awards not as individual achievement, but as honoring the exploits of their units". After 71 years, there are not many veterans left. We thank "Mr. D" for his service, not only as a veteran but also as a dedicated leader of Kona Hongwanji. He served as kyodan president from 1990 to 1998 and thereafter as Advisor to the board. **Arigato "Mr. D."**

Hawaii Kyodan Dues: Hawaii Kyodan, various temples and some members have expressed concerns regarding our Hawaii Kyodan dues. Due to the continuing operational loss each year, in 2007 the Board made the difficult decision to pay \$1,000 every month and identify other sources of income to ensure the survival of our temple for the next generation. This decision meant carrying a large balance forward each year. In January 2011, Bishop and members of Hawaii Kyodan met with our board to discuss payment of dues. At their next meeting the board implemented the following: 1) raise membership dues \$20 every year; 2) request additional donation from members for dues; 3) borrow from the Living Memorial Fund to build new rental units; and 4) delay over \$300,000 in maintenance projects. **Borrowing monies from the Living Memorial Fund means, it must be replaced.** This restricted fund is an "Endowment fund" started in 1980 by our pioneers. Policies are in place for its use. Since 2007 our annual Hawaii Kyodan dues ranged from \$35,000 to \$42,288.89. On paper our financials looks good, similar to other temples including Hawaii Kyodan, as majority of monies are in reserved funds for specific use. Our 2013 dues was \$36,377, we paid \$22,490 (\$10,490 from member donations added to \$12,000). 2014 dues is \$38,118, we continue to pay \$1,000/month and your donations to date (6/1/14) is \$6,391. Our balance brought forward is \$109,789.76. Pressure is mounting from Bishop and Hawaii Kyodan to meet our financial obligations. The question for members is--**sustainability!** Do we want Kona Hongwanji to be here for the next generation? You are encouraged to attend board meetings to voice your concerns, support and/or listen to proceedings. The board meets on the 2nd Wednesday of every EVEN month (February, April, June, August, October, December) at 7:00 p.m.

Bad to the Bon

I never thought I'd see another Bon dance, much less dance in one, but that's exactly what happened during a visit to my sister's home in June. My sister lives in Ontario, Oregon, home of the Idaho-Oregon Buddhist Temple, where I first learned about Amida Buddha and Jodo-Shinshu. The temple, like Kona Hongwanji, is in a rural farming region. An ad for Murakami Produce reads, "See us for all your onion marketing needs." Unlike Kona, however, there are no other Buddhist temples for hundreds of miles in any direction. It is truly alone. Yet, for 68 years the temple has held a one-day celebration of the Obon season and Japanese culture. It's a small affair, compared with the Bon dances in Hawaii, but has always been well supported by the entire community. The local newspaper runs a special section on the event each year, and lots of area businesses advertise in it.

Long known as Japan Nite, the event now bills itself as the Obon Festival. It is held from 4 to 9 p.m., which is entirely in the daylight because Ontario is on the very western edge of the Rocky Mountain time zone. There are no lights in the lanterns and the yagura is more a stage than a tower. We were lucky that the temperature was in the 80s, because it is often well over 100. Maybe because of that, there are only eight dances, with a half-hour intermission in the middle.

There are also only three rehearsal nights for the dances, all held the week of the Bon dance. We managed to get there for the last practice. We were hoping some of the dances would be ones we knew from Kona, but the Tanko Bushi was the only one we'd ever done before. Unlike in Hawaii, where it is always the first dance, it has always been the concluding dance in Ontario. I would guess they do it last because dancers might be ready to drop from heat exhaustion by that time most years. We had a hard time trying to learn the unfamiliar dances by just doing them once each, and we were even two years out of practice for the Tanko Bushi, though that one came back pretty quickly. We were also able to catch on to a slower, simple number done to the old song "Sukiyaki." It was done with castanets held between the thumb and forefinger so we could click out the beat of the song while doing graceful arm motions. It reminded me of hula dances where they use flat stones between the fingers. An older lady said she had always liked the beautiful song, but that it was named "Sukiyaki" because that was the only Japanese word Americans knew when it was written. It might as well have been called "Teriyaki." The dancing actually opened with the Hanagasa Ondo done with hats. We'd used Bon towels, fans and sticks in dances, but never hats. We were surprised to see that they used Bon towels in only two dances, then put them all back into boxes like we do with sticks. They tried to gather up the Kona Hongwanji towels we were proudly wearing, but we explained we brought our own.

Most of the dancers at the practice were teenagers who had been recruited out of Fruitland High School across the border in Idaho. Most were neither Japanese nor Buddhist, but they seemed to be having a lot of fun. Rev. Fujimoto's wife Sharmon choreographed a modern dance to "Happy" from the movie "Despicable Me." We tried it once, but had trouble keeping up with the teenagers. It just moved too fast. The temple had a stock of yakutas and happi coats to loan out to the dancers. None of them were large enough to fit us.

The actual festival began at 4 p.m. with the opening of the food booths. They offered tempura boxes, shish-kabob, udon and bento boxes. Desserts included my favorite, andagi, which they called Okinawa dango. Unfortunately, by the time we arrived around 6 p.m., they were out of just about everything except mafa chicken, which was fried that morning and refrigerated until the evening. We hadn't encountered the word "mafa" in Hawaii and wondered if it was a Japanese spelling of mar-far chicken,

which you find in Chinese restaurants. They told us it was chicken fried in flour and bean curd. In any case, it tasted just fine. They also sold a variety of Obon T-shirts which said, yes, "Bad to the Bon."

The temple was open from 4 to 6 p.m. for a series of half-hour talks such as "Four Marks of Existence," "Obon and Obon Dancing," and "Elements of a Sunday Service." They also had half-hour taiko and kempo demonstrations, and a display of Japanese bridal gowns. It was all very interesting and educational for those who didn't know much about Japanese culture or Buddhism, which was the majority of those attending. By 7:30, everything had been closed down and cleaned up so everyone could concentrate on the dancing. It all started with a procession of dancers and spectators holding hats containing flower petals which they cast into the air. That's why the first dance was the Hanagasa Ondo, or Flower Hat Dance. Surprisingly, half the people left after the food was gone. Even fewer spectators remained after the half-hour intermission following the first four dances. The teens from Fruitland High School made up a good percentage of the dancers, but there were also some of the ladies from the temple and a fair amount of spectators joining in to give it their best shot. By the closing Tanko Bushi dance, most of the people left were dancing.

In contrast to Rev. Shoji, who rarely did more than one circuit of the opening Tanko Bushi in Kona, Rev. Fujimoto either danced or drummed in all the numbers, and he did it in those traditional raised wooden sandals. As he opened the dancing, he said, "There's an old saying that you are a fool if you dance and you are a fool if you don't dance. Since you are a fool either way, you might as well dance." It was a treat for us to be dancing fools once more.

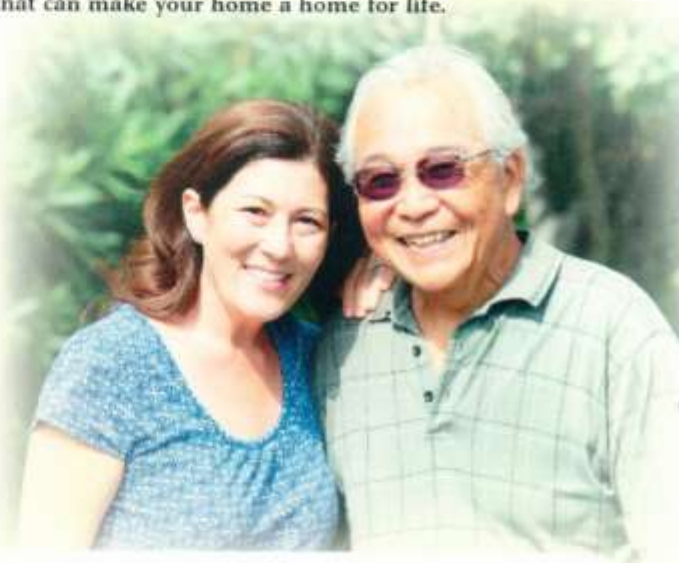
